Worship Attendance

The average in-person Sunday worship attendance over four Sundays in September and October was 44. Services had an average of 70 live and archived Facebook views.

Weekly Giving

Tithes and offerings through September totaled \$135,537.51, or an average of \$3,475 a week. Primary Fund giving for 2025 is budgeted at \$195,000, or an average of \$3,750 a week.

Per Capita Contributions

The 2025 per capita is \$41 per member, for a total assessment of \$5,535. As of October 1, per capita contributions totaled \$1.480.

PW Again Raises Funds For Huntingdon House

For many years, Presbyterian Women has supported Huntingdon House, our community's domestic abuse shelter, through the Angel Tree Project. Due to the pandemic, Huntingdon House changed its donation format from needed clothes and toys to a monetary one, which still continues.

Barbara Williams and Heather Beckwith, a strong mother-daughter duo, are PW's co-chairs of this endeavor, which runs for only three weeks. This timeline gives the Huntingdon House staff time to purchase and distribute gift cards to those under its care and protection, allowing these residents to purchase specific holiday needs for them and their children.

The 2025 Angel Tree Project begins Sunday, **November 16**, and concludes Sunday, **December 7**, which gives three full weeks for monetary donations.

If giving by check, please make the check out to Presbyterian Women with Angel Tree in the memo line and drop it in an offering plate. Financial Secretary Sharon Caufield will pass along these donations to Presbyterian Women, which will write one check to Huntingdon House. As in the past, any donations arriving late will be given to Huntingdon House via a second check from Presbyterian Women.

HPC's church family has given generously over the years to Huntingdon House through the Angel Tree Project. The members of Presbyterian Women are praying that many of you will remember victims of domestic abuse in our town and county through monetary gifts of any amount during this holiday season.

Help Assemble Kits For Disaster Victims

Volunteers are needed at HPC to assemble Heart Kits at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, November 20. The kits, also known as hygiene kits, are distributed to those in need at times of disaster.

It's not too late to donate to this important mission project. The Mission and Outreach Committee is receiving monetary contributions through Sunday, **November 2**. Please write "Heart Kits" in your check's memo line or fill out a pew envelope noting "Heart Kits." Checks and envelopes can be placed in an offering plate.

The kits cost about \$15 each and contain personal items needed by survivors of disasters such as toothbrushes, soap, deodorants, combs and washcloths. Your donations enable the committee to purchase items in bulk for the kits.

Heart Kits are collected by Presbyterian Disaster Assistance in collaboration with Church World Service.

Insurance Switched to Erie

The session's Property Committee reported that effective October 13 the church's fire and liability insurance has been switched to Erie Insurance. The policy covers the entire church, including its slate roof. The cost of the policy is a little less than what the church was paying to Brotherhood Mutual Insurance for a policy that did not include the roof.

might require folks to work on these festive days. We should, indeed, be grateful for the first responders and all the people who show up when something breaks or goes wrong even on days when the rest of us get to rest. But I don't believe Italian food rises to that level of absolute necessity. This headline about Olive Garden shouldn't have been news at all.

In classic Pastor Brett fashion, I started to overthink all this. What does it say about our moment in history that not working on the most significant holidays of the year is news? I thought immediately about some debates I've heard recently concerning whether or not modern workers work more than medieval peasants. Yes, there is a debate about this. And believe it or not, modern people work far more days in a year than medieval peasants. Though it should absolutely be noted that most modern work isn't nearly as labor intensive. An "apples-to-apples" comparison here is not possible for a variety of reasons. But the comparison is still a little jarring. A modern employer will make greater claims than a feudal lord on their employee's time.

How did we get to this place? Are we so captured by the lure of consumption that we demand others serve us Italian food on the most important holidays? Are we so wedded to materialism that earning and producing are not allowed to be halted for even a day? Have we created economic conditions so desperate that folks are not only willing to work on these special days but afraid to take off lest they fall behind or get let go?

As is most often the case, the real problem behind these problems is that we often lose sight of the real purpose of things. Work and material prosperity are good things. But they are not the proper, final goal. They are a means to achieve a higher end. A careful reading of Genesis will show us that we were created for work. But the purpose of that work was to help God order creation for the benefit and enjoyment of all.

Throughout Scripture, material prosperity was seen as a sign of divine blessing. But it was always accompanied with an obligation to use that blessing for the benefit of others.

As long as we neglect the higher spiritual aims and pursue only the material things that support them, life will feel disordered and we'll end up missing out on both. Walt Disney once said something that touches on this truth. When talking about the purpose of his company, he said, "We don't tell stories in order to make money. We make money in order to tell stories."

This year I'm especially thankful for all the things I can't possibly attain with a check. I'm thankful for the love and companionship of friends and family. I'm thankful for the peace, contentment, joy, meaning and hope of my faith. I'm thankful for the love and grace of God given freely to me in Jesus Christ. These are the blessings life was made for. These are the blessings that will endure throughout eternity.

As we gather around our tables on Thanksgiving, it is good, right and even our duty to thank God for the material blessings and abundance we enjoy. But let us never forget to give thanks for all the higher blessings those things serve.
