When Holiday Cheer Is Hard to Find

How will you be spending your Christmas? What will you be doing on the most hyped-up holiday of the year? Maybe this Christmas will be pretty standard and traditional for you. You'll gather with family, exchange gifts and share in a meal together. You might even go through that pattern multiple times as you visit multiple families. Or maybe this year will be a little different for you. Perhaps you're planning on taking a trip to a faraway place where they decorate palm trees instead of evergreens.

No matter what your plans are, there can be an enormous amount of pressure to make this time of year especially cheery. The holiday season is supposed to be a time of happy feelings where good tidings just bubble up from the ground. I blame cheesy holiday movies for creating those expectations.

But for many people, holiday cheer is hard to come by. Broken family situations, financial problems and recent loss can be combined with cultural expectations of togetherness and happiness, which makes Christmas very bleak for those struggling through tough circumstances.

Session Recommends Vote for Officer Slate

The session voted on November 16 to recommend that the congregation approve the Nominating Committee's slate of candidates at a special meeting on November 30. Nominations also were to be accepted from the floor.

The committee, co-chaired by Ann Dunlavy and Betsy Mason, presented the following slate:

Session: Paul Post and Kathy Criswell were nominated for their second three-year terms and Amanda Hetrick was nominated for her first three-year term. They comprise the class of 2028. There is one vacancy for a three-year term. Coupled with two current vacancies, next year's session will have nine members if no one is nominated and elected from the floor.

Deacons: Barb Williams was nominated for a second three-year term and John Brockett and Jay Periotti were nominated for their first three-year terms as the class of 2028. There is one vacancy for a three-year term. Coupled with a current vacancy, next year's Board of Deacons will have 10 members if no one is nominated and elected from the floor.

Personnel Committee: The congregation each year elects two members of the committee. Janet Rudy was nominated for a second term and Sue Lang was nominated for her third and final consecutive term. Other committee members are named by the session and deacons.

Auditor: The congregation each year elects three auditors. Judy Post was nominated for her first term, Pam Kyper for her second term, and Jennifer Kann for her third and final consecutive term.

Nominating Committee: The congregation each year elects three members of the committee. Deb Hetrick and Zack Byers were nominated for their first term and Ann Dunlavy was nominated for her second term. Other committee members are named by the session and deacons.

There is no special magic about the holiday season that shields us from experiencing the realities of life. Even families that have the shiniest veneer of perfection can find this time of year to be full of worry, stress and sadness. I don't mean to be a "downer" here, but it is worth remembering that many people struggle through the holidays, or at the very least find it to be a time filled with stress.

I find that truth to be enormously significant because God didn't come to earth in perfect circumstances. We tend to idealize the Christmas story with serene nativity scenes and cute Christmas pageants. But the truth is that God in the flesh was born in a barn to an unwed teenage mother. He was wrapped in rags and put in an animal feeding trough. And then was made a spectacle of by a bunch of smelly, uninvited shepherds. This is not a nice story. This is a mess.

If God came into the world in the midst of that kind of mess, then He can come into any kind of circumstances. He can come into our broken and

worry-filled lives and bring hope and true life and joy. That is what God is all about. God isn't waiting for you to be perfect before He can have a relationship with you. He is reaching out to you right now, mess and all. That is the true wonder of Christmas. God has come to us and is still coming to us.

It is my hope that you are experiencing the joy of Christmas, of God's presence, in your life right now. If that presence seems distant or uncertain, then I invite you to come to worship with us. Hear the hope of the gospel and learn how to experience God's nearness again.
