# HPC Offers Krislund Camp Scholarships

**H**untingdon Presbyterian Church is offering full scholarships for young people in the Huntingdon area to attend Krislund Summer Camp in eastern Centre County.

The money is coming from maintenance funds set aside decades ago when HPC became trustee of the Standing Stone Chapel in Blair Park. HPC ended its trusteeship of the chapel late last year, with the chapel reverting to the Blair family.

The session agreed with the Finance and Stewardship Committee's recommendation that the leftover funds be used for Krislund scholarships. This use would be in the spirit of Anna Fisher's gift of the chapel, which was originally built to provide Sunday school for children in the east end of Huntingdon. Miss Fisher was a niece of Kate Fisher Blair, wife of stationery entrepreneur J.C. Blair, who donated the land.

Several options exist for summer camping at Krislund. Except where indicated, the camps run for one week, and cost from \$245 to \$545:

- Day Camps for grades 1-5 and 6-8
- Mini Camp for grades 1-2 consisting of three days and two nights
- Residential Camps for grades 3-5; 6-8; and 9-12

Campers are responsible for their own transportation to and from Krislund, a Christian camp and retreat center in Madisonburg operated as a joint venture by three presbyteries.

Lenten Bible Study concluded April 9, so now it's back to all things books. Please join us at 10 a.m. in the Memorial Family Room for a discussion of *The Agitators: Three Friends Who Fought for Abolition and Women's Rights* by Dorothy Wickenden.

The three women are Harriet Tubman, famous for the Underground Railroad; Francis Seward, wife of Lincoln's Secretary of State who hid her radicalism in public; and Martha Coffin Wright, a Quaker mother of seven and "... a dangerous woman in the eyes of her neighbors ... who organized women's rights and antislavery conventions across New York state ..." They are unlikely friends who made a difference.

The Agitators "... opens in the 1820s when Tubman is enslaved and Wright and Seward are young homemakers bound by law and tradition, and ends after the war [the Civil War] bringing "... a vibrant, original voice to this transformative period in our history." (Amazon)

This biblical realism and honesty applies to mothers. Some mothers are towers of strength and devotion. Hannah the mother of Samuel is a good example. She prayed to God for a son and then dedicated him to be a priest. Every year she made Samuel a new robe, which showed her deep love and devotion. God used Hannah's love to raise up one of the most important prophets and judges in Israel's history.

Some biblical mothers are not as praiseworthy. Think about Rebekah, the mother of Jacob and Esau. She had a clear favorite child: Jacob. That favoritism broke apart her family for years when she convinced her favorite son to trick his father and cheat his brother out of his blessing. Jacob was forced to run away for fear of Esau's retaliation. But God actually used Rebekah's mistake to work out His plan for salvation. In that exile, Jacob married Leah and she gave birth to Judah. And over the course of time Jesus came from the line of Judah.

Perhaps the most comforting thing we can learn about mothers from the Bible is this: mothers are real people, too. They work hard and do the best they can for their families, but sometimes they make mistakes like everyone else. And that is okay. Even though Rebekah made terrible mistakes as a parent, God was able to work through those mistakes and accomplish something great. God redeems our mistakes. If you are a mother, take comfort and strength from that assurance. And for all of us who have a mother (that means everyone), remember that mothers are people too.

Give thanks to God for mothers. Their sacrifice, support and love helped to make us the people we are today. And, if you need to, forgive the mistakes that mothers make. They are, after all, real people just like you in need of forgiveness and grace.


## **Sunday Study Focuses on Acts**
